Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Valerie's House, Inc. (a Florida not-for-profit corporation) (the "Organization"), which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2024, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, based on our audit, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Valerie's House, Inc. as of December 31, 2024, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Valerie's House, Inc. and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Management's Responsibilities the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Valerie's House, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

NOTE A - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization and description of activities

Valerie's House, Inc. (the "Organization" or "Valerie's House") was established on April 5, 2015, under the laws of Florida as a not-for-profit organization for grieving children in Florida. The mission of Valerie's House is to help children and families work through the loss of a loved one together and go on to live fulfilling lives. Valerie's House has locations in Fort Myers, Naples, Punta Gorda, Port Charlotte, and Pensacola.

Valerie's House is a place for children to connect with one another and learn the tools to heal after they have experienced the death of a loved one and learn that their loss doesn't have to limit their dreams. The vision of Valerie's House is that no child will grieve alone.

Valerie's House provides programs designed to give children and families a safe place to share, grieve, and grow. Valerie's House also supports parents and caregivers as they cope with the loss of a spouse or child. Programs at Valerie's House include open-ended peer support groups and activities to help children to heal after a significant loss in their life. While it is not a formal counseling center, Valerie's House provides a community and a platform for individuals to come together, share and mentor one another through grief, and create supportive bonds they can take into their futures. Programs are provided at no cost to the families.

Basis of accounting

The accounting and reporting policies of the Organization conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and are in accordance with the audit guide issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, "Not-for-Profit Organizations" and ASU 2016-14 and the accounting standards issued by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) in the Accounting Standards Codification (ASC).

The Organization prepares its financial statements on the accrual basis of accounting. Grant revenues are recorded as support when performance occurs under the terms of the specific grant agreement. Grant revenue includes all resources received from another entity in accordance with an entitlement or grant document.

NOTE A - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, CONTINUED

Financial statement presentation

The financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 958-205. Under FASB ASC 958-205, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets: net assets with donor restrictions and net assets without donor restrictions.

The Organization reports its contributions in accordance with FASB ASC 958-605. In accordance with FASB ASC 958-605, contributions received are recorded as with donor restrictions or without donor restrictions depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Under FASB ASC 958-605, such contributions are required to be reported as contributions with donor restrictions and are then reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions upon expiration of the time restriction or compliance with the purpose restriction.

Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of the Statement of Cash Flows, the Organization considers all undesignated, highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Contributions receivable

Contributions receivable are unconditional promises to give, with donor restrictions, that are recognized as contributions when the promise is received. Contributions receivable that are expected to be collected in less than one year are reported at net realizable value. Contributions receivable that are expected to be collected in more than one year are recorded at fair value at the date of promise. That fair value is computed using a present value technique applied to anticipated cash flows. Amortization of the resulting discount is recognized as additional contribution revenue.

NOTE A - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, CONTINUED

Property and equipment

The Organization's policy is to capitalize assets with a cost of \$3,000 or more and a useful life greater than one (1) year. Property and equipment is recorded at cost, except for donated items (used in operations of the Organization) which are recorded at fair market value as of the date received. Assets are depreciated using the straight-line method over their respective estimated lives, as follows:

Advertising costs

The Organization's policy is to expense advertising costs as such costs are incurred.

Compensated absences

Valerie's House accumulates and records a contingent liability for compensated absences accrued by employees. Upon termination of employment, employees can receive payment for vacation leave up to 160 hours if they meet certain criteria. Unused vacation leave and related employer costs as of December 31, 2024, have been accrued and recorded as a liability.

Fair value of financial instruments

The FASB ASC Topic "Financial Instruments" clarifies the definition of fair value for financial reporting, establishes a framework for measuring fair value, and requires additional disclosure about the use of fair value measurements in an effort to make the measurement of fair value more consistent and comparable.

Valerie's House's financial instruments consist of cash and cash equivalents, receivables, payables, and accrued liabilities. Valerie's House estimates that the fair value of all financial instruments do not differ materially from the aggregate carrying values of its financial instruments recorded in the accompanying Statement of Financial Position due to their short term nature.

NOTE A - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, CONTINUED

Fair value of financial instruments, continued

Valerie's House adheres to the requirements of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820-10-50-1 through 820-10-50-8 (formerly Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 157, "Fair Value Measurements"). FASB ASC 820-10 established a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level (1) inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority. Level (2) inputs are from other than quoted market prices included in Level (1) that are observable for the asset or liability either directly or indirectly. These inputs include quoted market prices in active markets for similar assets. Level (3) inputs have the lowest priority and consist of unobservable inputs for the asset or liability, which are typically based on an entity's own assumptions, as there is little, if any, related market activity. Valerie's House uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure fair value of its investments. When available, Valerie's House measures fair value using Level (1) inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. No Level (1) or Level (3) inputs were used by Valerie's House at December 31, 2024. See Note H for Level (2) inputs.

Assets and liabilities such as cash, receivables, payable and accrued liabilities are recorded at cost which approximate fair value due to the short term nature of the assets and liabilities. Promises to give have been recorded at Net Present Value (NPV).

Impairment of fixed assets

The Organization adheres to FASB ASC 360-10 (formerly SFAS No. 144), "Accounting for the Impairment or Disposal of Long-Lived Assets." FASB ASC 360-10 requires, among other things, that entities identify events or changes in circumstances which indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable.

There was no effect on the Organization's financial statements resulting from FASB ASC 360-10 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Contributions

In order to observe restrictions which donors place on grants and other gifts, as well as designations made by the Board of Directors, all assets, liabilities and activities are accounted for in the following net asset classifications:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions - not subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions - subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they be retained and invested permanently by the Organization or temporary stipulations that may be fulfilled by actions of the Organization to meet the stipulations or become unrestricted at the date specified by the donor.

Donated services

A number of volunteers, including the Board of Directors, have donated significant amounts of their time and expertise to the Organization's programs and supporting services. No amount has been reflected in the financial statements for these donated services, inasmuch as no objective basis is available to measure the value of such services.

Volunteer Services: Volunteers are a vital part of the success of the programs at Valerie's House, Inc. For the year ended December 31, 2024, there were 261 volunteers who collectively provided 6,068 hours. These in-kind services have not been valued or recorded in these financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting standards as they do not meet the criteria for recording.

The Organization was provided common-area meeting space to conduct support groups and activities at their Punta Gorda, Port Charlotte and Pensacola locations at no cost. No amounts for rent and related facility use benefits have been recorded by the Organization as no reasonable basis to do so has been determined.

In-Kind Contributions

In-kind contributions are recorded in the accompanying financial statements at their cost or estimated fair value if cost value is not available on the date of the receipt.

NOTE A - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, CONTINUED

In-Kind Contributions, continued

Contributions of services are recognized only if services received (a) create or enhance nonfinancial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are provided by the individuals possessing those skills, and would typically be purchased if not provided by donation.

The Organization received various in-kind contributions in the amount of \$276,582 for program supplies, services, and construction material. The total of all in-kind donations has been recorded as both a revenue and increase to program supplies and various services.

Revenue recognition

Revenue from Exchange Transactions: The Organization recognizes revenue from these types of transactions in accordance with FASB Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") 2014-09, Revenue from Contracts with Customers, as amended. ASU 2014-09 applies to exchange transactions with customers that are bound by contracts or similar arrangements and establishes a performance obligation approach to revenue recognition.

The Organization records the following exchange transaction revenue in its statement of activities for the year ended December 31:

Special Event Revenue - The Organization conducts special events in which a portion of the proceeds paid by a donor represents payment for the direct cost of the benefits received by the donor at the event - the exchange component, and a portion represents a contribution to the Organization. Unless a verifiable objective means exists to demonstrate otherwise, the fair value of the benefit is measured at cost to the Organization. The contribution component is the excess of the gross proceeds over the fair value of the benefit received by the donor. The direct costs of the special event are recorded as direct donor benefits in the Statement of Activities. The performance obligation is the delivery of the event. The event fee is set by the Organization. FASB ASU 2014-09 requires the Organization to allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations. As such, the Organization presents the exchange and contribution components of the gross proceeds from special events. For special event fees received before year-end for an event that will occur after year-end, the Organization follows

Revenue recognition, continued

AICPA guidance where the inherent contribution is conditioned on the event taking place and is therefore treated as unearned revenue along with the exchange component.

Revenue from Non-Exchange Transactions: The Organization recognizes revenue from these types of transactions in accordance with FASB ASU 2018-08, clarifying the Scope and the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made. ASU 2018-08 applies to non-exchange transactions. The Organization records the following non-exchange transaction revenue in its Statement of Activities for the years ended December 31:

Contributions and other grants - Revenue from contributions is recognized at the time the contribution is made. Revenue from grants is recognized as reimbursements are requested and barriers are met.

All grantor-restricted support is reported as an increase in net assets with donor restrictions, depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the Statement of Activities as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions with donor restrictions, whose restrictions are met in the same reporting period, are reported as unrestricted support.

Functional Expenses/Cost Allocation

The cost of providing the various programs and other activities has been detailed in the Statement of Functional Expenses and summarized on a functional basis in the Statement of Activities. The Statement of Functional Expenses reports certain categories of expenses that are attributable to more than one program or supporting function. Therefore, these expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The expenses that are allocated include compensation, related benefits and workers compensation insurance which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort. The remaining expenses were specifically identified according to their purpose and charged directly to program or supporting services according to their natural expenditure classification.

NOTE A - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, CONTINUED

Income taxes

No provision for income tax expense has been made in the accompanying financial statements since the Organization is exempt from income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). In addition, the Organization is not a private foundation within the meaning of Section 509(a) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Internal Revenue Code provides for taxation of unrelated business income under certain circumstances. Management believes the Organization met the requirements to maintain its tax-exempt status and has no income subject to unrelated business income tax. The Organization's income tax returns for the past three years are open and subject to examination by tax authorities, and may change upon examination. The Organization reports no unrelated business taxable income; however, such status is subject to final determination upon examination of the related tax returns by the appropriate taxing authorities.

Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Tax Items

The Financial Accounting Standards Board has issued guidance on accounting for uncertainty in income taxes and the Organization has adopted this guidance. The Organization has evaluated its tax provision and any estimates utilized in its tax returns, and concluded that it has taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the financial statements to comply with the provisions of this guidance. Interest and penalties associated with uncertain tax positions will be recognized in income tax expenses, if required.

Management estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Allowance for Credit Losses

In June 2016, the FASB issued guidance (FASB ASC 326) which significantly changed how entities will measure credit losses for most financial assets and certain

other instruments that aren't measured at fair value through change in net assets. The most significant change in this Standard is a shift from the incurred loss model to the expected loss model. Under the Standard, disclosures are required to provide users of the financial statements with useful information in analyzing an entity's exposure to credit risk and the measurement of credit losses. Financial assets held by the Organization that are subject to the guidance in FASB ASC 326 were contributions receivable and other receivables. The Organization adopted the Standard effective January 1, 2023. The impact of the adoption was not considered material to the financial statements and therefore not recorded for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Subsequent events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through November 18, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

At December 31, 2024, capital campaign for a new facility - restricted cash balance was \$957,261, \$1,125 for Family Initiatives and \$75,100 for future Endowment totaling \$1,033,486 and is reflected as net assets with donor restrictions.

Concentration of credit risk

The Organization maintains its cash and cash equivalent balances at a financial institution which at times may exceed federally insured limits. The cash and cash equivalents are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000. The uninsured bank balance as of December 31, 2024, was \$2,466,837. The Organization has not experienced any economic losses on such account. The Organization believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk regarding its cash balances.

The investment is recorded at fair value, as reflected on the Statement of Financial Position as of December 31, 2024. The Organization uses fair value measurements to record adjustments to its investment and to determine fair value disclosures.

At December 31, 2024, the CDs are not restricted.

The Organization's investment policy allows management to invest in available investment vehicles to maximize income. Management has also attempted to minimize risk while working to achieve maximum investment returns.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that changes in market interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. Generally, the longer the maturity of an investment, the greater the sensitivity of its fair value to change in market interest rates. This is not considered a significant risk in relation to the investment held by the Organization.

NOTE D - CONDITIONAL CONTRIBUTIONS RECEIVABLE

During the year ended December 31, 2021, the Organization received a conditional promise to give in exchange for the permanent naming of one room in the new Valerie's House (new facility). The Organization met the condition of the pledge by raising an additional \$500,000 toward the construction of the new facility. The receivable is valued at net present value using a discount rate of 3.25% (prime rate at date of inception). The Organization collected \$100,000 of the promise to give during the year ended December 31, 2024. Management believes the receivable is fully collectible.

The Board had not self imposed any other limits on net assets without donor restrictions at December 31, 2024.

The Organization's goal is generally strive to maintain unrestricted financial assets to meet one year's operating expenses.

NOTE H - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

In accordance with FASB ASC 820, the Organization uses fair value measurements to record adjustments to certain assets. FASB ASC 820 defines fair value as "the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date." The Codification also sets out a fair value hierarchy ranking the levels of the inputs used as assumptions in the valuation techniques used to value an asset or liability. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in an active market for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of hierarchy are described as follows:

Level 1 - inputs are quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that are accessible at the measurement date. An active market is a market in which transactions of the asset or liability occur with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.

Level 2 - inputs are from other than quoted market prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. These inputs include quoted market prices of similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted market prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, and pricing models developed principally from inputs from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

Level 3 - inputs are unobservable and allowed in situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the asset or liability at measurement date. These inputs reflect the reporting entity's own assumptions about factors that would be used by market participants.

The Organization uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs

This Standard requires lessees to recognize the assets and liabilities that arise from leases in the statement of financial position. Additionally, in July 2018, the FASB issued ASU 2018-11, Leases (Topic 842) - Targeted Improvements, provides an additional transition method that would allow entities to not apply the guidance in ASU 2016-02 in the comparative periods presented in the financial statements and instead recognize a cumulative-effect adjustment to the opening balance of net assets in the period of adoption. The Organization had no permanently restricted net assets at December 31, 2024.

The Organization had restricted cash in the amount of \$1,033,486, restricted conditional contribution receivable of \$190,656, and restricted contributions of \$407,059 at December 31, 2024, including temporarily restricted net assets.

NOTE K - ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE CONCENTRATIONS OF RISK

The operations of Valerie's House, Inc. is dependent on the receipt of support and revenue from grantor agencies, donors and fundraising events. Loss of these funds and/or large decreases in these types of funding would have a material effect on the Organization and a negative impact on overall operations. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Organization received approximately 96% of its support from donations and grants.

NOTE L - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Organization is currently receiving and previously has received grants, contracts, and other third party funds which may be subject to special compliance audits by the grantor and other third party agencies that provided these funds. These audits may result in disallowed expense amounts.

NOTE L - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES, CONTINUED

Disallowed amounts, if any, constitute a contingent liability of the Organization. Such liabilities are not reflected within the financial statements of the Organization, as management does not believe any material contingent liabilities exist.

The Organization entered into a lease agreement with the City of Fort Myers for the use of land for a term of ninety-nine (99) years beginning in November 13, 2019, for a sum of a one (1) dollar annually. The Organization has the option to purchase the land in the amount of \$210,000 in year seven (7) through ten (10) of the lease term. The Organization is required to begin construction of a facility that provides children's grief services within thirty six (36) months of the commencement of the lease. The Organization started construction on the facility during the year ended December 31, 2022, and completed construction in 2024.

NOTE M - RETIREMENT PLANS

The Organization established a simple IRA plan (the "Plan") during the 2021 fiscal year for eligible employees. Employees were eligible to participate in the Plan if they are expected to earn at least \$5,000 in compensation in the calendar year and have received at least \$5,000 in compensation during at least two preceding calendar years. The Organization contributed a matching contribution up to a limit of 3% of the respective employee's compensation for the calendar year.

However, on August 1, 2024, Valerie's House, Inc. established a self-directed defined contribution retirement plan (Plan 001) that operates under Section 401(k) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). All full and part time (greater than 1000 hours per year) employees age 21, except leased employees, non-resident aliens and members of a bargaining unit, are eligible to participate in the Plan upon completion of at least one year of employment. Plan entry date is the first day of January or July after completion of the eligibility criteria. The Plan has an automatic enrollment feature. The auto enrollment starts at deferral of 3% of compensation. Each year it increases by 1% until it reaches 10%. The Plan also accepts Roth contributions. The Employer Safe Harbor Match is 100% of the employee deferred contributions up to 4% of compensation. The employee is 100% immediately vested in the Employer Safe Harbor Contributions. The catch up and Roth contributions are not eligible for the Safe Harbor contribution but are eligible for a discretionary employer match up to 4%. The discretionary match vests using a three year cliff schedule. Rollover contributions are permitted. Normal retirement is 65 or five years Plan participation.

NOTE M - RETIREMENT PLANS, CONTINUED

The Plan has no early retirement provision. All withdrawals are lump sum distributions. All distributions \$5,000 or less are immediately paid. In service and hardship distributions are permitted. Participants become eligible for Safe Harbor matching upon attainment of age 21. Retirement benefits for participating employees are provided through American Funds Company, the Plan custodian/trustee. Employees may defer compensation (contribute) to the Plan up to annual levels per IRS code. Participants are immediately vested in their deferrals. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Organization contributed \$31,514 in matching contributions, which is included in employee benefits expense.

NOTE N - IN-KIND DONATIONS

Donated Goods and Services

The Organization receives in-kind contributions of time and pro bono services from members of the community and volunteers related to program operations, special events, and fundraising. Donated services are recognized as contributions if the services (a) create or enhance nonfinancial assets, or (b) require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Organization. The Organization recognizes in-kind contribution revenue and a corresponding expense in an amount approximating the estimated fair value of the donation.

NOTE O - UNITED WAY CONTRIBUTIONS

The Lee County United Way provided the Organization with annual allocated grants of \$41,500 for the year ended December 31, 2024. The United Way of West Florida and United Way of Charlotte provided the Organization with \$22,122 and \$58,396, respectively, for the year ended December 31, 2024. Total United Way contribution revenue was \$122,018 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

NOTE P - SUBSEQUENT EVENT

Subsequent to the year ended December 31, 2024, the Organization's Naples lease for office space ended. As a result, the Organization leased another space. The lease term is one month, automatically becoming month-to-month. The monthly payment amount is \$1,300.
